Be sure to be there when Mayo Schneider flips the switch to light up Florissant's Christmas Tree. *LET THE HOLIDAYS BEGIN!* 




### St. Ferdinand Shrine Christmas Concert Sunday December 14th 3:00pm – 5:00pm

We hope that everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving Holiday and had the chance to spend some quality time with your family and friends.

Our 17th Annual Fall Festival last October was again another success despite a heavy fog. (I am insisting it was not rain but just a very damp fog) A special thanks to all of the volunteers including Old Town Partners, the Missouri Arts Council, and the Regional Arts Commission, our Parks Recreation and Theatre Departments, Public Works and Police for everything they did to make the Fall Festival another great success. The Senior Dinning Center is getting a face lift with some repairs and a new coat of paint. This historic building was the first City Hall and sits behind Buchholz Mortuary which occupies the building that was our second seat of government and the top cornice facing St. Francois still says "City Hall".

Don't forget about this year's Senior New Year's Eve party. This is one of the most popular events and it always sells out quick. This year theme is A Night to Remember. The party will be on Wednesday, December the 31st at the James J. Eagan Center from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. I would like to commend Finance Director Randy McDaniel, all of our Department heads for working together in preparing the FY2015 budget. I would also like to commend the City Council and the members of the Administration for working together to craft a prudent financial plan for the 2015 Florissant Budget. This budget contains a blueprint to continue to operate the city in a professional manner and with the same high level of programs and services that our residents expect. One of my goals with this budget, as with my past budgets, is to anticipate expenditures for the next fiscal year so as to reduce the need for supplemental appropriations. The economic situation continues to present challenges but has noticeably improved in 2014. Sales tax in the general fund, our single most important revenue source, is budgeted to increase \$400,000. Of the other major revenue sources, gasoline tax is up \$25,000 while the utility tax is up \$200,000.

Economic Development in the City is robust with investors making a commitment to build or renovate to locate stores and restaurants in Florissant. Both small and large companies have been looking to us for new business opportunities. Walmart is under construction and ahead of schedule without a TIF and is projecting a Spring 2015 opening. Culver's restaurant anticipates an opening in mid- December. CVS Pharmacy has probably already opened by the time this paper is mailed. Shelves were stocked and the final construction is almost complete as I write this. Sweetie Pie's restaurant will open on or before November 1st. Jimmy John's restaurant anticipates an opening in February 2015.

With the current economy slowly rebounding, progress in the City continues to grow. As Mayor I will insist that we will continue to do our part in bringing new businesses to the area to continue to achieve encouraging levels of retail and commercial investment in the City of Florissant which will help us in future budgets.

Also as the Mayor of the largest City in the County, I continue to encourage economic development from all areas in Florissant and the greater North County area in an effort to provide jobs for our current and future residents. In the wake of civil unrest in the Metropolitan area I have had face to face discussions with Governor



Nixon, Congressman Clay, newly elected County Executive Steve Stenger and I have talked to Senator McCaskill's office to advocate that all appropriate vacant land near Lambert Airport be designated tax favored enterprise zones to attract more large employers like Boeing, Emerson, Express Scripts and Covidien as well as medium and small manufacturing, fulfillment and warehousing employers. The job potential of vacant land near an underutilized new runway at Lambert must be harnessed to create a renewed prosperity that is needed to help solve the challenges our region is facing today.

In preparation for your holidays please reflect on the blessings of liberty that were obtained in large measure by a desperate but determined Continental Army that crossed the Delaware River with General Washington on Christmas Eve, 1776. Please say a prayer of thanks now for the sacrifice of our military around the world and our police and firefighters here at home. On behalf of Police Chief Lowery and the members of our award winning Police Department, all of our devoted Department heads and wonderful employees in all of our departments, the Administration, Judge Boyle and the Florissant City Council I would like to wish you and your family a wonderful and safe Holiday Season and a Happy New Year.



### Florissant Police and AAA Offer Winter Weather Driving Tips

With the winter months fast approaching we at the Florissant Police Department would like our citizens to take a few minutes to review their winter driving habits. As we all know hazardous driving conditions due to rain, sleet and snow can result in hazardous highway conditions. Here are some tips from the American Automobile Association, AAA.

Severe weather can be both frightening and dangerous for automobile travel. Motorists should know the safety rules for dealing with winter road emergencies. AAA reminds motorists to be cautious while driving in adverse weather. For more information on winter driving, the association offers the How to Go on Ice and Snow brochure, available through most AAA offices. Contact your local AAA representative for more information.

AAA recommends the following winter driving tips:

- Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.
- Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated.
- Never mix radial tires with other tire types.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up.
- If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.
- Do not use cruise control when



driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).

- Always look and steer where you want to go.
- Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.
- Tips for long-distance winter trips:
- Watch weather reports prior to a long-distance drive or before driving in isolated areas. Delay trips when especially bad weather is expected. If you must leave, let others know your route, destination and estimated time of arrival.
- Always make sure your vehicle is in peak operating condition by having it inspected by an AAA Approved Auto Repair facility.
- Keep at least half a tank of gasoline in your vehicle at all times.
- Pack a cellular telephone with your local AAA's telephone number, plus blankets, gloves, hats, food, water and any needed medication in your vehicle.
- If you become snow-bound, stay with your vehicle. It provides temporary shelter and makes it easier for rescuers to locate you. Don't try to walk in a severe storm. It's easy to

lose sight of your vehicle in blowing snow and become lost.

- Don't over exert yourself if you try to push or dig your vehicle out of the spow
- Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna or place a cloth at the top of a rolled up window to signal distress. At night, keep the dome light on if possible. It only uses a small amount of electricity and will make it easier for rescuers to find you.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe isn't clogged with snow, ice or mud. A blocked exhaust could cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to leak into the passenger compartment with the engine running.
- Use whatever is available to insulate your body from the cold. This could include floor mats, newspapers or paper maps.
- If possible run the engine and heater just long enough to remove the chill and to conserve gasoline. Tips for driving in the snow:
- Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Applying the gas slowly to accelerate is the best method for regaining traction and avoiding skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry. And take time to slow down for a stoplight. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.
- Drive slowly. Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads. Accelerating, stopping, and turning nothing happens as quickly as on dry pavement. Give yourself time to maneuver by driving slowly.
- The normal dry pavement following distance of three to four seconds

should be increased to eight to ten seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.

- Know your brakes. Whether you have antilock brakes or not, the best way to stop is threshold breaking. Keep the heel of your foot on the floor and use the ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.
- Don't power up hills. Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads just starts your wheels spinning. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed downhill as slowly as possible.
- Don't stop going up a hill. There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.
- Stay home. If you really don't have to go out, don't. Even if you can drive well in the snow, not everyone else can. Don't tempt fate: If you don't have somewhere you have to be, watch the snow from indoors.





### **Share Your Bounty with Your Loved Ones**

It's almost Thanksgiving, a holiday that once celebrated the harvest season. Although many of us today may not be directly connected to agriculture, we still gather on Thanksgiving with our loved ones to share whatever "bounty" we may have. But this practice doesn't have to begin and end with food. Why not incorporate the spirit of sharing into your overall financial strategy?

Furthermore, if you invest in your home state's 529 plan, you may receive state tax incentives. Tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, though, so you'll need to consult with your tax advisor about your situation. Another benefit of 529 plans: You control the

assets right up to the point at which they are actually used. So, if you have been putting away money for a particular child (or grandchild) and he or she decides against college, you can easily switch to another beneficiary.

• Review your insurance policies. If something were to happen to you, is your life insurance sufficient to take care of your family? In other words, would there be enough money available to pay off your mortgage, send your children to college and help your surviving spouse meet at least some of his or her retirement expenses? A financial professional can help you determine if your life insurance is sufficient for your needs.

• Consider involving your family with your estate plans. To help ensure your wishes get carried out the way you intended, consider keeping family members informed of your estate strategy, which could involve your will, living trust, power of attorney and other legal documents. And don't forget to keep your beneficiary designations up to date on your retirement accounts and your life insurance policy. So if you've gone through changes in your family situation, such as a divorce or remarriage, work with your professional team, including your financial advisor and your tax and legal advisors, to make ensure your investment strategy aligns with your estate goals.





### Stroke Risk Higher for Women Than Men

Everyone should be aware of the warning signs of stroke. In the United States, stroke is the fourth leading cause of death among men and the third leading cause of death in women, according to the American Stroke Association.

"As a matter of fact, about 55,000 more women than men have a stroke each year and strokes kill twice as many women as breast cancer every year," said R. Charles Callison, M.D., an interventional vascular neurologist with SSM Neurosciences Institute at DePaul Health Center.

A stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is disrupted due to a blocked or ruptured blood vessel. The brain is very oxygen-dependent, so even a few minutes without oxygen-rich blood can cause brain damage and bring on telltale stroke symptoms. Classic symptoms include sudden weakness; paralysis or numbness in the face, arms or legs; trouble speaking or understanding speech; vision disturbances; and sudden mental status changes, such as confusion or memory loss.

Some risk factors are the same for men and women:

- a family history of stroke
- high blood pressure
- high cholesterol
- smoking
- diabetes
- being overweightnot exercising

Other risks are unique to women:

- taking birth control pills
  being pregnant; stroke risk increases during a normal pregnancy due to nati
- during a normal pregnancy due to natural changes in the body such as increased blood pressure and stress on the heart
- using Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT), a combined hormone therapy of progestin and estrogen, to relieve menopausal symptoms
- having a thick waist and high triglyceride (blood fat) level; post-menopausal women with a waist size larger than 35.2 inches and a triglyceride level higher than 128 milligrams per liter may have a

five-fold increased risk for stroke

• being a migraine headache sufferer; migraines can increase a woman's stroke risk 3-6 times, and most Americans who suffer migraines are women The key to treating and surviving stroke is quick medical intervention.

"If you notice anyone exhibiting the symptoms above, it is imperative to call 911 immediately," said Callison. "Do not attempt to drive the individual to the hospital because emergency medical personnel can begin life-saving treatment in the ambulance en route to the nearest emergency room."

DePaul Health Center is one of only two Joint Commission-certified Comprehensive Stroke Centers in the state of Missouri.

An acronym to help you remember this information is FAST – Act FAST for Stroke!

- Face Facial droop, uneven smile
- Arm Arm numbness, arm weakness
- Speech Slurred speech, difficult to understand
- Time Call 911 and get to the hospital immediately

Strokes caused by a blocked blood vessel can be treated with medicines that dissolve clots, but the medicine must be administered as soon as possible to maximize its effectiveness.

"Once at the hospital, a patient may have a procedure to further open the blood vessel by delivering clot-busting medication directly to the blockage or removing the clot via a catheter," said Callison.

Strokes due to sudden bleeding in the brain may require surgery to repair the ruptured blood vessel and ongoing treatment to reduce blood pressure and help prevent future problems.

Reducing stroke risk is largely a lifestyle issue. Regular physical activity, not smoking, maintaining a healthy weight, and managing blood pressure and cholesterol are among the most important things individuals can do to help prevent stroke.

"It's most important to see your primary care doctor for an annual exam to evaluate and manage for your stroke risk factors," said Callison.


