From the **Florissant Disability Awareness Commission**

Hello, and thank you for being a part of our mission to make the public aware of folks with disabilities. Actually, every one of us has a disability; some mild, some severe, some physical, some mental. What we all want to do is just live in harmony with each other and enjoys the same advantages, opportunities and access as everybody else. I'm going to try to highlight each month, something important to one disability or another. During October, the highlight was on blind and visually impaired. October the fifteenth has been designated as White Cane safety day. On October 6th, 1964, the U.S. Congress signed the White Cane Safety day in to law. In 2011 it was also named by Barack Obama to be Blind American Equality day. On this day you may see sighted and visually impaired people alike, advocating to inform the public about the White Cane law in their state which spells out to drivers the procedure of yielding to persons with a white cane and the penalty if the law is broken.

October 10th is recognized as World Mental health day. On this day advocates strive to inform the public about mental illness and it's effects on people who suffer from this condition. They also want to make folks aware that there is help for persons diagnosed with mental illness to be able to lead a normal life and they advocate dispelling the stigma of mental illness.

November is filled with many so called (awareness days) but the only disability recognized in November is Lennox-Gastaut syndrome which is recognized on November first. Lennox-Gastaut syndrome (LGS) is a difficult-totreat form of childhood-onset Epilepsy that most often appears between the second and sixth year of life. LGS is characterized by frequent seizures and moderate to severe intellectual impairment. All disabilities are something that requires strength knowledge and advocacy to understand and overcome. We at the Florissant Disability Awareness Commission are here to provide this assistance to persons with disabilities, as well as their family members. Recycling During the Holidays

With the holidays nearly upon us, it's important to focus on the environmental impact that comes with the Christmas season. Try to avoid using Styrofoam fillers such as packing peanuts, but if you do, use the peanuts made from corn starch which are biodegradable and will break down over time in the landfill.

Meridian Waste Services will once again offer curbside pickup for real Christmas trees this year free of charge for all Florissant residents regardless of their having weekly yard waste service. The tree must be free of all contaminants such as lights, tinsel, garland and ornaments. Any tree that is six foot long or taller should be cut in half. Trees can be brought to your curb on the day of the week that vard waste would usually be picked up in your neighborhood through the entire month of January. If you have any questions pertaining to Christmas tree free curbside pickup, you can call Meridian Waste Services at 314-291-3131.

Meridian will also provide a recycling container in St. Ferdinand Park near their old recycling center for the specific purpose of disposal

of holiday lights. The container will arrive prior to the holiday and remain through the month of January. If you require any information about the recycling your holiday lights, please contact the Health Department located in St. Ferdinand Park at 314-839-7654.

Safety Tips for Holiday Shopping

Shopping in Stores:

• Do not buy more than you can carry. Plan ahead by taking a friend with you or ask a store employee to help you carry your packages to the car.

• Save all receipts. Print and save all confirmations from your online purchases. Start a file folder to keep all receipts together and to help you verify credit card or bank statements as they come in.

• Consider alternate options to pay for your merchandise, such as onetime or multi-use disposable credit cards or money orders, at online stores and auction sites.

 Wait until asked before taking out your credit card or checkbook. A thief could look over your shoulder to get your account information.

Walking to and From Your Car: Deter pickpockets. Carry your

purse close to your body or your wallet inside a coat or front trouser pocket.

• Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle. Check the back seat and around the car before getting in.

• Do not leave packages visible in your car windows. Lock them in the trunk or, if possible, take them directly home.

Shopping with Small Children:

 If you are shopping with children, make a plan in case you are separated from each other.

Select a central meeting place. Teach them to know they can ask store personnel or store security employees if they need help.

Shopping Online:

• Before surfing the Internet, secure your personal computers by updating your security software. Everyone's computer should have anti-virus, anti-spyware, and anti-spam software, as well as a good firewall installed.

 Keep your personal information private and your password secure. Do not respond to requests to "verify" your password or credit card information unless you initiated the contact. Legitimate businesses will not contact you in this manner.

• Beware of "bargains" from companies with whom you are unfamiliar—if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!

 Use secure websites for purchases. Look for the icon of a locked padlock at the bottom of the screen or "https" in the URL address.

• Shop with companies you know and trust. Check for background information if you plan to buy from a new or unfamiliar company.

Dry Air in Homes is Costly, **Uncomfortable and Unhealthy!**



Comfort and health both suffer in the winter and dry air is a major cause. When cold air from outside is heated in the home the relative humidity (RH) drops significantly.

As the air dries out it becomes damaging to both a home and its residents. Dry indoor air causes a myriad of problems, including: Increased likelihood of colds, flu and upper respiratory ailments. Viruses that cause colds and flu thrive in low humidity, so dry indoor air can spread airborne viruses more easily than air that is properly humidified. According to The American Society of Otolaryngology, dry air can make people more susceptible to infection. Dry air also aggravates allergy and asthma symp-

• Damage to home furnishings. Dry air causes walls, woodwork and hardwood floors to crack, which can lead to costly repairs or replacement.

• Higher energy costs. Air that is not properly humidified causes people to feel colder at higher temperatures. This leads homeowners to turn up the thermostat, increasing energy bills.

Control Dry Air

Dry air is also responsible for a number of the comfort issues that people experience in the winter. Air in the house that is below 35 percent RH can cause nosebleeds, sore throats and dry, itchy skin.

To reduce damage to the home and improve health and comfort, homeowners must improve the RH of their indoor air. In fact, it can even increase the chance of getting sick. 



Time for a Year-End Investment Review



Throughout the spring, summer, and fall seasons the birds in our area can count on an abundance of food, including the many feeders available in just about any backyard in town.

Although sources of food for birds may be harder to find in the winter, residents still do their part to provide our feathered friends with plenty to eat. However, a simple desire to feed the birds may set up a food chain that includes predators and scavengers such as squirrels, rats, raccoons, opossums or even larger birds of prey.

Bird feeders not only attract the birds in the area but will also attract some not so welcome guests. Our Health Department and Animal Control Officers deal with these types of nuisance situations on a daily basis. In almost every case the root of the problem can be traced back to

> something as simple as a bird feeder, spilled bird seed lying on the ground or as in some cases, uneaten dog or cat food left outside and believe it or not, even dog waste.

So remember, keep your yard clean and look for other ways to take care of our birds and keep those unwanted guests

where they belong!

Cold Weather Tips for Your Pets

1. Take your dog outside only for as long as it takes to relieve him or herself. Small, shorthaired breeds such as Chihuahuas and terriers suffer from the cold despite their seemingly warm fur coats.

2. Dogs frequently lose their scent in snow and ice. More dogs are lost during the winter than during any other season. 3. Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he or she comes in out of the rain, snow, or ice. Check your dogs foot pads, which may be bleeding from snow or ice encrusted in them. He or she may also pick up salt and other chemicals on their feet accidentally. As

we all know dogs lick their feet and these chemicals could hurt your pet if swallowed.

🏲 4. Antifreeze, even in very tiny

doses, is a lethal poison for dogs and cats. But because of its sweet taste, animals are attracted to it. Be sure clean up spills thoroughly. 5. By law, all dogs must have a sturdy well built shelter available at all times. In the winter, but sure to pack your dogs shelter with

straw to help hold in the heat and keep your animal dry. Water will freeze quickly, be sure to maintain your dogs water bowl so it will not freeze over.

Living In Harmony with Wildlife **Tips on Preventing Conflicts**

The City of Florissant encourages its residents and neighbors to live in harmony with wildlife. As suburban sprawl continues to displace wild animals, some conflicts with humans are inevitable. However, many can be avoided with little effort and planning.

allow wildlife access.

• Check your roof eaves, overhangs, vents, chimney stacks and even cracks around your windows or pipes that lead into the house. Caulk, screen, or make repairs if needed to prevent wildlife from entering your home.



The city's Health Department offers the following tips on preventing conflicts with our wild neighbors:

The smell of garbage is a huge attraction to wildlife. Keep lids on trash containers and secured at all times. Store containers in garage if possible, especially overnight. Make sure to sanitize your containers often. Don't leave pet food outside, pick-up what your pet does not eat and remove animal waste from property daily.

- Clean below bird feeders, as seed can attract scavengers such as raccoons and skunks, squirrels, rats, etc.
- Pick up fruit as soon as it has fallen from the trees.
- Trim back overgrowth and any branches that overhang the roof. These branches provide easy access to your roof, vents and eventually the attic.
- Remove brush piles / yard waste from your property.
- Check your deck and block or screen off any entry points that

- Make sure your chimney is capped or screened.
- Keep your lawn grub-free and you will prevent raccoons, skunks, moles, and opossums from tearing up your lawn to feast on them.
- Sprinkle plants with Epsom salts or cayenne pepper to deter wildlife from feasting on them.
- If a wild animal has made a nest on your property, you can try placing ammonia soaked rags near the nest site, shine a light continuously on the nest site and place a radio nearby tuned to loud music. In most cases, the parent will be encouraged to move the young elsewhere.

Be advised, trapping and relocating wildlife is not a solution. If your yard or home is appealing to wildlife and an animal is trapped and relocated, another animal will most likely take its place. The best long term solution is to keep your property in good repair and use appropriate and humane deterrents to discourage wildlife from taking up residence.
