

St. Ferdinand Shrine Celebrates 200 Years In Florissant

Two Hundred years ago a small group of Sacred Heart Sisters, including St. Philippine Duchesne, left St. Charles and came to Florissant to teach the Native American children and to officially open a Church for all residents. Florissant at that time was a small village of probably forty families. The town had a log church in the middle and many of its occupants participated in farming while they hope that the Spanish government would soon leave, and the area would finally have a French government. The French did take over and Florissant and the French influence helped shape the beginnings of Florissant.

The log Church-built in what is now Spanish Land Grant park-was built by the French, the Commander of Florissant was French, people spoke French and the arrival of Mother Duchesne solidified the French influence. The City of Florissant became a city in 1787 and although controlled by the Spanish government was full of French people. Streets were named with French names, St. Pierre, St. Denis, St. Ferdinand, St. Charles. St. Francois are a few. Because of the early settlers, Florissant is recognized as one of the oldest cities in the State of Missouri.

So today, 2018, brings us to praise the strength of Florissant and the strength of Old St. Ferdinand Shrine. St. Philippine Duchesne added to this strength by coming to Florissant, in 1819. This resulted in the building of a school for Native Americans, having a Church built for her and the sisters that came with



her, a convent to house the sister, boarding school students, and bringing a Church that was a necessity for the new residents. With all these new happenings, Florissant grew, new residents built homes, St. Ferdinand Parish for the French and Sacred Heart for the Germans, became important to the growing community. The railroad became important to Florissant and it was Important to the growth of this community.



Florissant Recycling



Greetings Friends,

Welcome to the first edition of the Mayor's Message in the Florissant Focus for 2018. I am compelled to share a serious topic with the Citizens of Florissant regarding a challenge the Administration faces as a result of the Early Retirement Incentive that the City Council passed despite my Veto last year. Eligible employees had until February 1 to elect to accept and must retire by May 31 this year.

The number of employees who elected to retire early was 18. The city will go forward without almost 5 centuries of valuable experience, 481.5 years to be exact. It will cost the City \$661,725 in buy out expenses to pay for the early retirement incentives to the 18 valuable employees leaving. With that being said we will have the challenge of replacing three major department heads and top level management and support personnel. Fortunately the Police Department was not affected.

I want you to know that as Mayor I will do everything in my power to restore the high moral of our dedicated non uniformed employees and to fill the void with new leadership. I do not shrink from this challenge even though I did not welcome it. To this end I have requested a respected citizen from each ward to serve on an ad hock advisory board to assist the Mayor and Human Resource Director Sonya Brooks White to identify our challenges and determine a sound plan of action.

I have asked former Council Representative Robert Garrett and successful Florissant Professional Howard Nimmons to serve as co-chairmen of this committee. Mr. Garrett has both an engineering degree and a law degree and is a retired patent attorney. Mr. Nimmons is both a Certified Public Accountant and a Certified Financial Planner with an office in Old Town. Every member of this Advisory Board has demonstrated their devotion to our City.

The Administration stands ready to work with the City Council going forward to meet this challenge and prevail so as to continue the progress of our "The Beautiful City"!

Now I would like to share news in our beautiful city and what we can look forward to in the next couple of months.

Please join the Administration in an initiative to kick off a pre Valley of Flowers Spring Cleaning Campaign to recapture the spirit of the original Valley of Flowers. The original idea was to clean up, spruce up, fix up the city culminating in what has become the Valley of Flowers Festival which will run from the March 18th Trash Bash to the start of the Valley of Flowers Festival.

We will kick off the pre VOF Spring Cleaning Campaign with the 10th Annual Confluence Trash Bash on Saturday, March 24th from 8 am till noon; the Florissant location will be at Sunset Park, starting at the lower pavilion. Volunteers are needed to walk the park along the riverfront to clean up trash and debris to keep our watersheds clean. Individual volunteers, civic groups, and youth organizations are encouraged to attend; no experience is required, all are welcome.

Volunteers are asked to dress for the weather, bring gloves, and a water bottle. Breakfast will be provided at 8:00 am before the start of the event. We will also be asking all of our stake holders to find ways to be involved and anticipate that activity will accelerate the closer we get to the VOF. To volunteer please call City Engineer Tom Goldkamp at 314-839-7643.

Two other annual events will be part of this effort. The Electronic Recycling Event, sponsored by Midwest Recycling Center, is scheduled for Saturday April 7th from 9am to 1 pm. This event is open to nonresidents after 11 am. The Document Shredding Day, for residents only, is sponsored by Cintas and Meridian Waste Solutions, Inc. and will be held right after tax season on Saturday, April 21st from 9am to 12pm. Both of these popular events will be held at St. Ferdinand Park and more information will follow as the events get closer. Neighborhood spring cleaning events to remove old newspapers and the like are encouraged and organizers are asked to coordinate with City Engineer Tom Goldkamp at 314-839-7643.

The first Florissant Food Truck Knight will be held on Friday, April 20th sponsored by the Knights of Columbus and the City with future food truck nights scheduled for June 15th, August 17th and October 12th. There will be barrels to collect non-perishable canned and dry food for the nearby TEAM food pantry, and proceeds from the event will benefit Knight's sponsored charities including TEAM. To donate much needed funds to Team, please write a check payable to TEAM and mail it to 265 St. Catherine St. Florissant MO 63031.

Chief Lowery and I want to share with you a wonderful community service program that has had great success. Eddie is the Florissant Police Department German Shepherd who serves the people of North County with his special gift of unconditional affection and is partnered with Officer Lori Mahn.

Eddie's Heroes is an award given to specially recognize and honor individuals whose kind and generous spirit has touched the lives of others. There are many awards offered through athletics and scholastics, but individuals who are humble, do the right thing and go out of their way to help others are often overlooked.

Although these individuals are not seeking recognition, they change lives by taking action to make someone else's day better or even saving a life. These kind hearted giving individuals are the ones we tend to remember the rest of our lives.

Officer Mahn has found that while bringing Eddie to different places, Officer Mahn is constantly being told how Eddie has made someone's day better. Eddie's gift is showing love, regardless of one's gender, race, social status, or disability. Let's not neglect those that show unconditional love to their fellow man. These are the very ones that impact our lives and create forever memories and those are the memories that warm our hearts and make us smile.

So that we may recognize these individuals please submit a letter, detailing why an individual deserves this award, to Florissant Police Department, 1700 N. Hwy. 67, Florissant, MO 63033 ATTN: Eddies Heroes. Please include contact information for both the nominee and the person making the nomination. Those selected for the award will receive an Eddie's Heroes Medal and Certificate of Recognition.

The **Public Works Department** is preparing to do \$5,527,000 in street work which includes \$990,000 in slurry seal resurfacing work on 112 different streets, \$450,000 in concrete pavement replacement and repairs on 23 streets, and \$1,700,000 in major street repairs with an asphalt overlay on 19 different streets. Work also includes replacement of the St. Anthony Lane Bridge over Fountain creek estimated at \$550,000 and major street and storm water work on North Lafavette Street (N.Hwy.67 to Washington) estimated at \$2,327,000. Major street repairs will begin in early spring.

The street work on N. Lafavette Street and the replacement of St. Anthony Lane Bridge over Fountain creek are made possible from grants received from East-West Gateway Coordinating Council and Missouri Department Transportation. Recently MoDOT completed inspections of all bridge structures in the City and found no major problems on any of our structures.

The City has been officially notified that the Insurance Services Office (ISO) an independent insurer-supported organization has upgraded our Building Code Effectiveness grade from a Class 4 to a Class 3 (Class 1 being the highest). Effective code enforcement helps keep insurance rates down and has a major influence on the economic well-being of a municipality.

The new Justice Center (formerly the Dick Weber Bowling Lanes on Washington Street) is undergoing a complete renovation to accommodate a modern municipal court-room facility and police sub-station. Renovations will cost over \$4 million and be completed this summer in August.

The Public Works Department has also implemented a new program to monitor and maintain vacant properties and residential rental properties in the City. If vacant residential property owners refuse to maintain the exterior of their

properties, than the City will contract to have the work done and will bill the owner. Vacant properties left vacant for over six months must have them registered with the City so the Police and Public Works departments can keep an eye on them. Owners of residential rental properties must attend a Crime Free Seminar before they can renew their residential rental licenses for the year. These Crime Free Seminars have become popular, very informative to landlords and explains in much more detail how the City partners with landlords to monitor and maintain their properties and help keep good tenants.



Resident Camera Program



Do you currently utilize private video surveillance at your home or business? If you do, we'd like to hear from you.

Video surveillance is one of the best methods for apprehending criminals and convicting suspects who are caught in the act of committing a crime. Installing video surveillance is a great example of community-police partnerships and is something the Florissant Police Department values highly.

How Does it Work?

The Resident Camera Program allows residents and business owners to register locations and capabilities of their security camera systems with the Florissant Police Department. Using this information, when a crime occurs, the Florissant Police Department will know the locations of nearby video cameras and be able to collect video evidence and follow up on leads.

What are the Benefits of Registering your Camera?

Because they are caught in the act of committing the crime, video surveillance is one of the best methods to catch suspects and convict them. As crimes occur nearby, many residents and business owners unaware that their camera systems may have captured information that could help solve a crime. Likewise, police are not always aware of who may have potentially vital video evidence.

By registering your camera with the Florissant Police Department, officers can quickly identify nearby cameras that may have captured criminal activity. After registering your camera, you will only be contacted by the Florissant Police Department if

there is a criminal incident in the vicinity of your security camera and police personnel believe viewing your video footage will assist in the investigation.

Registration

If you would like to register your security camera system with the Florissant Police Department and allow officers to contact you should a crime occur in or near where your cameras are installed, please fill out the online form below.

Terms and Conditions

The information you provide regarding your camera systems will be for official use only. Your personal information will remain confidential and not be distributed except as required by law or court order. This program is entirely voluntary and you can withdraw consent to view video footage from your camera system at any time by calling the Florissant Bureau Investigation. If necessary, the Florissant Police Department will contact you directly, using the information provided by you at the time of registration, to request the appropriate video surveillance footage. Any footage containing or related to criminal collected by activity Florissant Police Department may be used as evidence during any stage of a criminal proceeding. Under no circumstances shall the registrants construe that they are acting as an agent and/or employee of the City of Florissant and/or the Florissant Police Department through the program.

Florissant Sees an Overall **Decrease in Crime**

Florissant, MO-Chief Timothy J. Lowery is happy to announce that crime in the City of Florissant has again decreased for the year 2017. Index crime statistics comparing 2016 to 2017 in Florissant show an overall reduction of 4%. The reported crimes are broken down in to two categories, Part I and Part II Crimes. Part I Crimes include Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Stealing, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson. Part II Crimes include Simple Assault, Property Damage, and Sex Offenses (other than Rape).

Chief Lowery attributed the drop in crime to the Officers who diligently patrol the streets

Florissant and the Investigators who are identifying and getting charges on repeat offenders. Chief Lowery said that a key component to the decrease was the close partnership the Police Department has with the Citizens of Florissant. "I encourage the residents to continue to call the police to report any suspicious activity as it is occurring."



What's the Investment Outlook for 2018?

By most measures, 2017 was a pretty good year for investors. But what can you expect in 2018?

It's difficult to precisely predict the immediate future of the financial markets. However, many signs point to improved global economic growth and rising corporate earnings – both of which are important drivers of stock prices. In the United States, economic growth may be more modest than in other regions, which could result in international stocks outperforming domestic ones.

Here's another consideration: Low interest rates typically benefit the financial markets – and unless inflation jumps sharply, the Federal Reserve will probably remain patient, only raising short-term rates slowly throughout 2018.

Despite these positive signs, there's also reason for caution. Political uncertainty and changes in economic policies may lead to increased market volatility. Another factor is the long-term history of the stock market, which includes a drop of 10% or more – technically called a "correction" – about once a year. We've gone two years since the last correction, so it would not be surprising if we saw one in 2018.

Given this outlook – which could be classified as "moderately optimistic" – what investment moves should you consider this year? Here are a few suggestions:

Rebalance your portfolio – The market's gains may have increased the value of your stocks so much that they now represent a greater percentage of your portfolio than you had intended – and you may not be comfortable with this increased presence.

So, you may want to rebalance your portfolio to achieve a suitable mix of stocks and bonds, based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. As part of this rebalancing, and in an effort to help reduce the impact of market volatility, you may need to add

investment-grade bonds and cash investments. (Of course, bonds carry some risks, too, including interest rate risk and credit risk.) The availability of cash will also make it easier for you to purchase stocks during a market downturn, when prices may be lower.

Look beyond U.S. borders - You may want to consider adding some international equity investments to your portfolio, if appropriate. As mentioned above, these stocks may do better than U.S. stocks in 2018, but regardless of performance, the presence of global stocks can help diversify your portfolio - and diversification can help decrease your overall risk level. (However, diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.) Keep in mind that international investing carries some inherent risks, such as those related to currency fluctuations and foreign political and economic events.

Be aware of "big" versus "little" – If you don't own many stocks of smaller companies, you might consider adding them to your portfolio. Smaller U.S. stocks have traditionally outperformed larger ones and may benefit from stronger economic growth and lower corporate tax rates. Be aware, though that small company stocks tend to be more volatile than those of larger companies. And, as with all stock investments, you may risk losing some or all of your principal.

You may want to consult with a financial professional to determine which of these moves, or any others, are right for you. You can't control the external factors affecting the financial markets, but you can take total charge of your own investment decisions – and in the long run, these decisions can help determine your success as an investor.

- Make sure identification tags are up to date and securely fastened to your pet's collar.
- It is a good idea to have a photograph of you and your pet, as it can establish ownership if you and your pet become separated.
- A microchip can be important to reunite you with a lost pet if they lose their collar. They may become sheltered in another area outside of your home locale.

Egg Decorating






