

Dectron Unit Installation Completed at Eagan Center

One of the significant upgrades to the mechanical system at the James J. Eagan Civic Center was the recently completed installation of a Natatorium Dehumidification Component, or simply the "Dectron Unit".

The project utilized performance contracting to upgrade and improve major heat transferring aspects of our mechanical systems needed for the Ice Rink, Swimming Pool and HVAC equipment. It also addresses building envelope and lighting issues to achieve a more energy efficient building with significantly lower maintenance requirements.


Excessive heat and humidity in the swimming pool area are real concerns and can cause structural problems in the facility. This newly installed equipment not only dehumidifies the air and provides better air quality in the swimming pool environment, it also recovers all the heat rejected from the dehumidification process and utilizes it for heat elsewhere in the facility. It also reclaims the water collected through the dehumidification process, heats the collected water with recycled energy, and returns it to the swimming pool.

Patrons will quickly notice a substantial increase in the comfort level of both the air quality and the water temperature in the J.J.E. Indoor Swimming Pool. This project will add many years of efficient enjoyment of the James J. Eagan Center amenities.

Tours of the Shrine will also be available. St. Ferdinand Shrine is located at the foot of St. Francois Street in Old Town Florissant and is next to the Knights of Columbus grounds, the site of the Valley of Flowers Festival.

Remember to recycle what you can through our single stream recycling system. Reduce what goes into our overloaded landfills by recycling those electronics and hazardous wastes. There will be an Electronic Recycling Day in Florissant on April 8th at St. Ferdinand Park from 9a.m. to 1p.m.. MRC Recycling charges \$5 for monitors, \$10 for any Freon carrying units, \$5 for LED/LCD/Plasma T.V.'s, and \$30 to \$50 for CRT T.V.'s depending on size. Please bring cash or check to cover these costs. Batteries and light bulbs can be recycled at our "Cool City Business" Batteries Plus at 113 N Hwy 67, Florissant, MO 63031. And hazardous household items can be properly dealt with through our StL Household Hazardous Waste drop off center located at 4100 Seven Hills Dr., Florissant, MO 63033. Greetings Everyone-

Welcome to the first edition of the Mayor's Message in the Florissant Focus for 2017. I would like to share news about the progress in our beautiful city and what we can look forward to in the next couple of months.

Please join the Administration in an initiative to kick off a **pre Valley of Flowers Spring Cleaning Campaign to recapture the spirit of the original Valley of Flowers**. The original idea was to clean up, spruce up, fix up the city culminating in what has become the Valley of Flowers Festival. The Festival theme this year is "The Wonders of the World" and the theme for the spring cleanup, spruce up, fix up will be "Our Wonderful Clean City" which will run from the March 18th Trash Bash to the Valley of Flowers Festival.

We will kick off the "Our Wonderful Clean City" campaign with the 9th Annual Confluence Trash Bash on Saturday, March 18th from 8 am till 1 pm; the Florissant location will be at Sunset Park, starting at the lower pavilion. Volunteers are needed to walk the park along the riverfront to clean up trash and debris to keep our watersheds clean. Individual volunteers, civic groups, and youth organizations are encouraged to attend; no experience is required, all are welcome. Volunteers are asked to dress for the weather, bring gloves, and a water bottle. Breakfast will be provided at 8:00 am before the start of the event. We will also be asking all of our stake holders to find ways to be involved and anticipate that activity will accelerate the closer we get to the VOF. To volunteer please call City Engineer Tom Goldkamp at 314-839-7643.

Two other annual events will be part of this effort. The Electronic Recycling Event, sponsored by Midwest Recycling Center, is scheduled for Saturday April 8th from 9am to 1 pm. This event is open to nonresidents after 11 am. The Document Shredding Day, for residents only, is sponsored by Cintas and Meridian Waste Solutions, Inc. and will be held right after tax season on Saturday, April 22nd from 9am to 12pm. Both of these popular events will be held at St. Ferdinand Park and more information will follow as the events get closer. Neighborhood spring cleaning events to remove old newspapers and the like are encouraged and organizers are asked to coordinate with City Engineer Tom Goldkamp at 314-839-7643.

The first **Florissant Food Truck Knight** will held on Friday, April 21st sponsored by the Knights of Columbus and the City with future food truck nights scheduled for June 16th, August 18th and October 13th. There will be barrels to collect nonperishable canned and dry food for the nearby TEAM food pantry, and proceeds from the event will benefit Knight's sponsored charities including TEAM. To donate much needed funds to Team please write a check payable to TEAM and mail it to 265 St. Catherine St. Florissant MO 63031.

The Park Police Program has been a great success resulting in positive direct interaction between our officers and the public enhancing the great relationship our Police have with our citizens. The high degree of visibility of our uniform police officer's in our parks and at our events has resulted in residents sharing with me that they feel a sense of safety and personal security while they enjoy our recreation facilities and attend our many community gatherings. This program has also resulted in positive Police Officer interaction with our citizens, especially our youth which fosters mutual respect and trust. Every Citizen can be the eyes and ears of the Florissant Police Dept. If you see something suspicious, call the Police Department immediately at 314-831-7000 or use 911 in an emergency. Your assistance to help us achieve our low crime rate has been and will continue to be appreciated by all the men and women of the Police Department. Our new Community Police Officer (Police Dept. Spokesperson) Steve Michael joins Chief Timothy Lowery and me to thank you for your assistance. We encourage you to become a part of the Neighborhood Watch Program. For information on how to start one please call 314-830-6042.

Street Work - The Public Works Department is preparing to do \$3,350,000 in street work this year 2017 which includes \$927,000 in slurry seal resurfacing work on 130+ different streets throughout the City, \$589,000 in concrete pavement replacement and repairs on 34+ streets, and \$1,834,000 in major street repairs with an asphalt overlay on 13+ different streets. Major street repairs will begin in early spring. Thanks to the passage of Prop S last November 2015 Florissant has street maintenance funds available. These funds will be used this year to make improvements to 11 different streets plus major improvements to Keeven Lane and St. Marie Street which will include all new curbs, gutters, and asphalt overly and other needed improvements.

The Public Works Department has three grant projects in progress this year that are funded at 80 percent by a federal grants received in 2014 and 2015.

• Design work is nearing completion for the replacement of St. Anthony Lane Bridge over Fountain Creek a \$550,000 project which will be constructed this summer.

• Design work and pre-construction work continues for the North Lafayette Reconstruction project which will include repaving the street, installing storm sewers, and adding ADA-compliant sidewalk and bicycle facilities from North Highway 67 to Washington Street with a total estimated budget of approximately \$2.7 million. Construction is scheduled for 2018.

• Design work and pre-construction work continues for the Replacement of the Pedestrian Signal on Derhake Rd. at Robinwood Elementary. This project will replace the aging signal and bring the crossing into compliance with ADA requirements. It has a budget of approximately \$140,000 and will be complete in 2018.

The City has partnered with MODOT and has been awarded another 80 percent federally funded reimbursement grant to make improvements to the intersection of St. Ferdinand St. and N. Highway 67 ... the main entrance to our St. Ferdinand Park ... primarily to ease congestion entering and exiting St. Ferdinand Park and to improve safety and pedestrian access.

The City has finalized a **comprehensive energy efficiency project at our James J. Eagan Center**. Please see the article on this in this edition of the Focus.

FLORISSANT HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM - the City of Florissant's Community Development Office will have applications available for the Home Improvement Program beginning Monday, April 3, 2017. 





What's Smarter -**Paying Off Debts or Investing?**

If you're just starting out in your career, you will need to be prepared to face some financial challenges along the way – but here's one that's not unpleasant: choosing what to do with some extra disposable income. When this happens, what should you do with the money? Your decisions could make a real difference in your ability to achieve your important financial goals.

Under what circumstances might you receive some "found" money? You could get a year-end bonus from your employer, or a sizable tax refund, or even an inheritance. However the money comes to you, don't let it "slip through your fingers." Instead, consider these two moves: investing the money or using it to pay off debts.

Which of these choices should you pick? There's no one "right" answer, as everyone's situation is different. But here are a few general considerations:

• Distinguish between "good" and "bad" debt. Not all types of debt are created equal. Your mortgage, for example, is probably a "good" form of debt. You're using the loan for a valid purpose - i.e., living in your house - and you likely get a hefty tax deduction for the interest you pay. On the other hand, nondeductible consumer debt that carries a high interest rate might be considered "bad" debt – and this is the debt you might want to reduce or eliminate when you receive some extra money. By doing so, you can free up money to save and invest for retirement or other goals.

• Compare making extra mortgage payments vs. investing. Many of us get some psychological benefits by making extra house payments. Yet, when you do have some extra money, putting it toward your house may not be the best move. For one

thing, as mentioned above, your mortgage can be considered a "good" type of debt, so you may not need to rush to pay it off. And from an investment standpoint, your home is somewhat "illiquid" – it's not always easy to get money out of it. If you put your extra money into traditional investments, such as stocks and bonds, you may increase your growth potential, and you may gain an income stream through interest payments and dividends.

 Consider tax advantages of investing. Apart from your mortgage, your other debts likely won't provide you with any tax benefits. But you can get tax advantages by putting money into certain types of investment vehicles, such as a traditional or Roth IRA. When you invest in a traditional IRA, your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income, and your money grows on a tax-deferred basis. (Keep in mind that taxes will be due upon withdrawals, and any withdrawals you make before you reach 59_ may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.) Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but your earnings are distributed tax-free, provided you don't take withdrawals until you reach 59_ and you've had your account at least five years.

Clearly, you've got some things to ponder when choosing whether to use "extra" money to pay off debts or invest. Of course, it's not always an "either-or" situation; you may be able to tackle some debts and still invest for the future. In any case, use this money wisely - you weren't necessarily counting on it, but you can make it count for you.

Living In Harmony with Wildlife Tips for Preventing Conflicts



The City of Florissant encourages its residents and neighbors to live in harmony with wildlife. As suburban sprawl continues to displace wild animals, some conflicts with humans are inevitable. However, many can be avoided with little effort and planning.

The city's Health Department offers the following tips on preventing conflicts with our wild neighbors:

• The smell of garbage is a huge attraction to wildlife. Keep lids on trash containers and secured at all times. Store containers in garage if possible, especially overnight. Make sure to sanitize your containers often. Don't leave pet food outside, pick-up what your pet does not eat and remove animal waste from property daily.

• Clean below bird feeders, as seed can attract scavengers such as raccoons and skunks, squirrels, rats, etc.

• Pick up fruit as soon as it has fallen from the trees.

• Trim back overgrowth and any branches that overhang the roof. These branches provide easy access to your roof, vents and eventually the attic.

- Remove brush piles / yard waste from your property.
- Check your deck and block or screen off any entry points that allow wildlife access.

• Check your roof eaves, overhangs, vents, chimney stacks and even cracks around your windows or pipes that lead into the house. Caulk, screen, or make repairs if needed to prevent wildlife from entering your home.

• Make sure your chimney is capped or screened.

• Keep your lawn grub-free and you will prevent raccoons, skunks, moles, and opossums from tearing up your lawn to feast on them.

• Sprinkle plants with Epsom salts or cayenne pepper to deter wildlife from feasting on them.

• If a wild animal has made a nest on your property, you can try placing ammonia soaked rags near the nest site, shine a light continuously on the nest site and place a radio nearby tuned to loud music. In most cases, the parent will be encouraged to move the young elsewhere.

Be advised, trapping and relocating wildlife is not a solution. If your yard or home is appealing to wildlife and an animal is trapped and relocated, another animal will most likely take its place. The best long term solution is to keep your property in good repair and use appropriate and humane deterrents to disNews from the Florissant Golf Club...


