# Valley of Flowers Festival May 3, 4 & 5

"Valley of Flowers Celebrates the Florissant Valley Fire Protection District's 100th Anniversary" – A Centennial of Caring...Then, Now, and Tomorrow"

Spring marks the arrival of the 57th celebration of the Valley of Flowers Festival. This Florissant family-oriented event, the North County's "First Festival of Spring," features a variety of attractions, highlighted by the Grand Parade and by the crowning of Florissant's Queen and her Court!

Activities during the three-day festivities will appeal to all ages. At the James J. Eagan Center fair-goers will find a Flower and Plant Sale, culturally diverse performances, a Vendor/Craft Fair, a Pretty Baby Photo Contest, and children's activities. Carnival games and exciting rides are featured at the Duchesne Home Association Fairgrounds (formerly called the Knights of Columbus Fairgrounds). Rounding out the fun, at Koch Park baseball games on Friday, at rue St. Francois on Saturday the annual Car Show, and of course mouthwatering food everywhere. The Grand Parade on Sunday, May 5, the highpoint of the weekend, leads to the crowning of the Valley of Flowers Queen and Court at the Duchesne Home Association Pavilion (formerly called the Knights of Columbus Pavilion). The parade with more than 100 units features mobile units departing from the James J. Eagan Center at 1:45pm. Decorated vehicles and floats proceed west on Parker Road to New Florissant Road where the walking units and the marching bands merge with them. The parade travels south on New Florissant, turns west on rue St. Francois past the official review stands, then left on St. Ferdinand to Washington Street and concludes at the **Duchesne Home Association Fairgrounds.** 

The parade theme is the "Florissant Valley Fire Protection District's 100th Anniversary" so decorations on floats and units reflect this theme. Participating in the parade are many city officials, local municipal emergency responder vehicles, the Valley of Flowers reigning Queen and Court and this year's 19 candidates, car clubs, walking units, horse groups, dog clubs, dance schools, and scout groups. Groups that make up the fabric of our community participate and create a colorful and fun parade!

The parade ends at the Duchesne Home Association Fairgrounds where the win-

ning parade units and their sponsors, and the Pretty Baby Photo Contest winners receive their awards. At 4:00pm Mayor Tim Lowery crowns the 2019 Valley of Flowers Queen and Court.

Please arrive early to get good seats along the parade route for one of the largest and most colorful spring parades in the St. Louis Metropolitan area; then join us at the Knights of Columbus Pavilion for the exciting award and crowning ceremonies! 

Hwy 67) next to St. Ferdinand Shrine will feature carnival rides, games, beverages, and traditional festival foods including their famous barbecue. Please do not park on the local shopping center lots. There is ample parking in the field on St. Charles Street or at St. Ferdinand Park and walk the path to the festival.

To maintain a family friendly and neighborhood atmosphere, the festival committee will once again require that anyone under the age of 18 must be accompanied

by an adult. Other short-term changes allow for better crowd management and traffic flow in and around the festival grounds. The plan includes temporary traffic regulations to prevent festival traffic from interfering with local businesses including the no parking policy at Florissant Meadows Shopping Center and Dierbergs, a well-enforced dress code and increased overall security. Also this year there will be a new layout for rides and ticket booths. There will be standalone, self-service ticket kiosks. Finally, all ticket booths will be equipped with credit card machines for added convenience.



### Mosquito Season is Upon Us

Here come the pesky mosquitos again. The City of Florissant is already taking measures to control mosquito populations. We will continue to do so, but our residents need to assist us by using these helpful tips:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water holding containers
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rainwater
- Repair leaky pipes & outside faucets
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree root holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete

• Make sure gutters and downspouts are free of debris to allow water to flow properly

• Change water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once each week

 Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well-trimmed around the house so adult mosquitos will not hide there.

Products can be purchased through a hardware store that can help treat yards and plants to help deter mosquito populations. Also remember to use products with DEET during peak mosquito times.

# **Should You Borrow** from Your 401(k)?

If you work for a business that offers a 401(k) plan, consider yourself fortunate, because a 401(k), with its tax advantages and variety of investment options, is a great way to save for retirement. But what if you need to tap in to your plan before you retire? Is it a good idea to borrow from your 401(k)?

To begin with, you need to determine if a loan is even available. You can only borrow from your 401(k) if you're still working for the company that offers the plan, but even so, you'll have to with your human resources area to determine if loans are allowed. If they are, you'll want to weigh the pros and cons before taking action.

On the "pro" side, it's pretty asy to get a 401(k) loan – there's no formal loan application and no minimum credit score required. Plus, you're only borrowing from yourself, and you can generally repay the loan with automatic paycheck deductions, typically over a five-year period.

However, you'll also encounter some "cons" when taking out a 401(k) loan, particularly concerning taxes. If you had not borrowed from your 401(k), the money you took out could have been growing on a tax-deferred basis, assuming you used pre-tax dollars to fund your plan, and your withdrawals will only be taxed once. But when you borrow from your plan, you will have to repay it, along with interest, with money you've earned - and been taxed on - and then, when you withdraw it later, you'll pay taxes on it again.

Furthermore, if you leave your employer before fully repaying your loan, the outstanding balance likely will be taxable, although you may have a grace period in which to pay it off and avoid taxes.

And perhaps even more important, taking money from your 401(k), even if you repay it later, will almost certainly slow the growth potential of your account - which, in plain terms, means you may have less money available for retirement.

Of course, if you encounter an emergency, and you have nowhere else to turn, you may need to borrow from your 401(k). And some plans allow hardship withdrawals for medical expenses and other needs, although you'll still be taxed on the amount you withdraw.

But you'd probably be better off if you can prepare, well in advance, for situations in which you need immediate access to a sizable sum. One way of doing this is to build an emergency fund containing six months' to a year's worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. You also might find some resources in the part of your investment portfolio held outside your 401(k). For example, you can always withdraw contributions to a Roth IRA without incurring taxes (although the earnings on these contributions could be taxable if you take the money out before you're 59½ and you've had your account less than five years).

In any case, you work hard to build your 401(k) – so, no matter where you are in life, think carefully about how you will use the money.

# Visit Historic St. Ferdinand Shrine During the Valley of Flowers Festival



### Log Cabin Open House

Saturday, May 4, 10:00-3:00 • 1065 Washington Street

The Florissant log cabin originally belonged to the Cougot family who owned the plot of land between St. Catherine and Washington Streets. In its original state the cabin had two floors and according to an interview with Mrs. Cougot in 1982, 13 children were raised in it. Through the years additions were added and the log cabin began to look like all the other homes in the area complete with multiple rooms, wood siding, and a cedar shake roof.

The Cougot family donated a portion of land to the City of Florissant. At this time the home had deteriorated and the city had plans for demolition to pave the way for a new water tower and tennis courts. Mrs. Rosemary Davison, a local historian and founder of Historic Florissant, fought to preserve the original log cabin lost inside the depreciated home. Mrs. Davison being a persistent woman, was eventually able to convince the city of the cabin's historic significance. Soon, the city agreed, during the demolition, to save the logs belonging to the cabin for the purpose of rebuilding.

Volunteers from the community came together to recreate a one story log cabin at Water Tower Park; the area the cabin is located today. Bernie Steinbruegge, Nelson Crank, Danny Crank, Josh Crank, Andy Lucas, Steve Siebe and others volunteered countless hours recreating the first floor of the log cabin. Some of the original logs were usable, yet many were disintegrated. Bernie Steinbrueggee located and used replacement logs from other dismantled



cabins. In an attempt to be as authentic as possible, chinking and wood shakes were used. A volunteer from the brick layers union (name unknown), built the working fireplace and chimney. As the roof was added, Keith English and boy scouts added shakes for a more realistic look.

Today the Florissant log cabin continues to be owned and maintained by the City of Florissant and is managed by Historic Florissant, Inc. It is opened for tours, field trips and special events by appointment. Saturday, May 4 the log cabin with be open 10:00-3:00 for a Valley of the Flowers Open House. Suggested donation is \$5 per family; however, any donation is greatly appreciated. Proceeds will be used by Historic Florissant, Inc. for the continued preservation and restoration work taking place in our city.







# Florissant's "A Walk Through History" Program

Florissant's Walk Through History program was the creation of former Mayor Robert G. Lowery, Sr. and former City Clerk and President of Florissant Historic, Inc. Rosemary Davison. Mayor Thomas P. Schneider enthusiastically continued the program with input from many individuals with historic ties to the city.

The Walk Through History recognizes those individuals who have made valuable contributions to the wholesome fabric of our beautiful city and North County as well as historically significant individuals with a connection with Florissant. The program provides an interesting feature that attracts visitors to Old Town Florissant who reflect on our rich history and hopefully frequent Old Town businesses.

The first plaque was dedicated in honor of Francois Dunegant dit Borosier who in 1786 was appointed military commandant of the new village of St. Ferdinand by the Spanish Governor of the Louisiana Territory. On August 23, 2008 a ceremony was held presided by then Councilman, Tom Schneider, Mayor Bob Lowery and Florissant Historian Rosemary Davison.

Two more plaques are scheduled to be ded-

icated this year in 2019. The first one will be on May 29 near the VFW Post 4105. Vietnam KIA/MIA/POW Staff Sgt. Charles Prevedel will be honored. His name is on the Florissant Vietnam Memorial obelisk and the Federal Building on Page Ave is named for Green Beret Special Forces Staff Sgt. Charles F. Prevedel. On August 28, near St. Francois and Clark, a plaque will honor Hal Schuchmann, who was a former Florissant Councilman, a member of the Board of Freeholders who drafted our current City Charter, and who was honored as a Lord of the Valley of Flowers.

Eleven plaques were commissioned by Mayor Lowery and twenty-nine plaques were commissioned by Mayor Schneider; two mentioned above still to be dedicated in 2019. The Walk Through History is located along Rue St. Francois Street between Florissant Road and St. Ferdinand Shrine. Walking west from Florissant Road, the first plaque you will encounter is shown at right. The texts below are from the 38 plaques as they appear by walking west on the north side of the street to the Old St. Ferdinand Church and then returning on the south side of the street.

### Francois Dunegant dit Borosier b. Canada 1752

d. Florissant September 13, 1825
Commissioned by the Spanish Governor as the Military and Civil Commandant of the Village of St. Ferdinand de Florissant throughout I the Spanish regime, often described as a man of honesty and integrity who shaped and guided the little settlement of Florissant in its earliest days.

#### **Gregorie Aubuchon**

Florissant's First Mayor

He was a descendant of Joseph Aubuchon who was in Florissant as early as 1799. In 1857 when the Missouri State Legislature changed Florissant's form of government from trusteeship to mayor-council.

He became the first mayor under the Special Charter.

#### **Charles Castello**

22 May 1839 – 11 December 1893 Elected twenty-seven times to the office of Mayor he served from 1865 to 1890 and then again from 1892 to 1893, dying in office. He helped to bring the West End Narrow Gauge Railroad to Florissant and under his leadership Florissant offered land and \$10,000 if it were made the county seat. While Charles remained in Florissant his father who is believed to have been the first Republican Sheriff of St. Louis County traveled to Colorado, settling there and giving the name of his hometown to Florissant. Colorado. Charles was Chairman of the St. **Louis County Democratic Committee from** 1888 to 1892 and a street in Florissant has been named for him.

#### **Joseph Peters**

1832 – 1913

A founder of the first bank in Florissant and of the Florissant Canning Factory, he owned the Joseph Peters Furniture Company in St. Louis. He has been described as "one of the industrial builders of St. Louis."

His home stood on the grounds of the 1970

City Hall and he is responsible for many of its beautiful trees.

#### John Mullanphy

Born 1758 In Enniskillen, Ireland Died In St. Louis September 29, 1833 It has been said "One man's name towers above all others as a giant among the great men of North County's past." When

Missouri became a State, he offered to build the State House at his own expense if Florissant were made the capital. He founded the first hospital west of the Mississippi and paid one-sixth of the cost of building St. Ferdinand's Church. He acquired Taille de Noyer in 1804 and his descendants lived there until 1961.



#### Robert G. Lowery, Sr.

Police Chief 1979-2001 Mayor 2001-2011 29
December 1938 - 30 July 2018
Bob Lowery began his 50 year career of service to Florissant residents as a Patrolman in 1961 advancing to Chief in 1979 & excelling in that position until elected Mayor in 2001. He loved Carole & his family. He loved people & always placed a priority on their safety.

Mayor Lowery delivered excellent municipal

Mayor Lowery delivered excellent municipal services, completed major renovations to recreations facilities, business development thrived & surrounding subdivisions were annexed increasing the size prestige of Florissant.

#### James J. Eagan

Born March 4, 1926
Died in office November 2, 2000
He was the first Mayor elected under the 1963 Charter. During his administration a new Community Center and Civic Center were built. He initiated the LSV program and free bus service for older residents. Proud of his Irish ancestry, he was affectionately referred to as the "Jolly Green Giant". A lawyer and judge, he served as Mayor for thirty-seven years.

#### **Jules Oneil**

He served as Mayor from 1955 to 1959. He was a staunch supporter of the 1821 St. Ferdinand Church recognizing its historical significance. Through his efforts and with community support, the building was saved. The preservation movement in Florissant began during his administration.

#### John H. "Johnny" Londoff, Sr.

"Family Businessman, Veteran,
Philanthropist & Celebrity!"
24 August 1924 – 11 May 2010
In 1940, John Londoff Sr. founded a Motor
Co. with his dad Harry. Then joined the
Marines in WWII. Famous jingle, Florissant



#### Richard "Dick" A. Weber

23 December 1929 – 14 February 2005
Dick moved to Florissant in 1955 and opened Dick Weber Lanes in 1971.
Founding member and longtime star of the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) from 1950's to 1990's. He was a bowling legend and one of the sport's most popular figures. Dick promoted bowling around the world and was a frequent competitor on the ABC broadcasts of PBA events. Along with his son Pete Weber, he is a member of the US Bowling Congress Hall of Fame. He is in

the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame and on the St. Louis Walk of Fame.



#### Paul F. Detrick, Sr.

Christian Hospital Founding Father 6 September 1923 – 31 August 1999
Paul Detrick named President of Christian Hospital 1960, Paul & Mary raised three children in North County, their home for life. His vision & leadership instrumental developing Florissant healthcare services opening Christian Hospital Northwest 1968 & Northeast Campus 1973.

Worked with Florissant civic leaders & board member of community organizations including Boatmen's Bank. Committed to the prosperity & well being of Florissant area residents & businesses. He & family were proud to serve the community.

#### Philip A. "Phil" Foeller

"Business Owner & Community Volunteer"
5 December 1929 - 25 November 2013
One of the original German families of
Sacred Heart Church. A lifelong community
oriented resident & businessman of
Florissant. He & his wife Rose Marie raised
five children in Old Town & founded
Florissant Auto Radiator still at 865 N.
Lafayette. U.S. Army Veteran, 1979 Chamber
President, 1980 Sacred Heart Man of the
Year, 4th Degree Knight of Columbus.
He never met a stranger & was always
willing to lend a helping hand to his
Florissant friends.

#### Arthur Bangert

Mayor of Florissant 1938-1950
Called the Father of Modern Florissant. He gave the City piped water, a sewer system, the first City library and established the Planning and Zoning, Public Works and Police Departments. He brought financial stability and legally changed the name from St. Ferdinand to Florissant.

#### Henry F. Koch

Born September 2, 1921
Died May 21, 1988

He was Florissant's first full-time salaried
City Clerk, serving from 1950 to 1960. In

elected as the first full-time Mayor and the
last Mayor under the 1857 Charter.
He spent 10 years with the St. Louis
Cardinals as a pitcher.

### **Sidney R. Garrett** *1864-1933*

1804-19 eeant firet

Served Florissant first as Town Marshal, then Postmaster and from 1915 to 1929 as Mayor. He was a partner in the St. Ferdinand Milling Company and as Mayor had the first street lights installed and established the Volunteer Fire Department.



#### Donald R. Zykan, Sr.

25 September 1932 – 1 March 1999 "If Nobody Can - Zykan"

Don Zykan, Sr. co-owned Zykan Bros. Solid Waste with his brothers Ed and Joe. Their Florissant based business was founded in 1932 by their father John M. Zykan. In 1951 Don married Florissant native Grace

Ebbesmeyer and they raised 5 children and served their community on the boards of many civic organizations with a passion for philanthropy. His priorities were Family, Friends and Community Service with a mission to always give back and help others.

#### **Henry F Hendel**

11 October 1917 – 1 August 2011

A life-long resident of Florissant and World War II Army Veteran. He was an active member of American Legion post 444 and Sacred Heart Catholic Church. Henry operated Hendel's Market for forty-seven years as a popular neighborhood grocery store. He loved Florissant and was an Ambassador for the City.

The Legacy of Hendel's Market continues.

#### Paul J. Kohnen

17 April 1922 – 31 October 2009

Paul was a lifelong resident of Florissant. In 1945 he married Thelma Korte & raised 6 children. Sergeant Kohnen served with the US Army Air Corps in England during WWII. In 1955 he opened Bergjan's Dairy later renamed Kohnen's Dairy. Past President Florissant Rotary Club & Chamber of Commerce. Board member Florissant Bank, Citizens Bank, & Christian Hospital. Lifelong parishioner at Sacred Heart Church. Paul lived for his family & invested in his church & community.

#### James E, Fischer

29 March 1924 - 1 August 2012
Co-Owned Fischer's Department Store with his brother Al, the oldest business in Florissant still in operation. Served as a Flight Engineer on a B17 Crew during World War II. Charter Member and past President of Florissant Rotary Club and Rotary District Governor. He was active on many Boards and had a strong passion for the Business Community in Florissant and the people that live here.

### Judge Timothy W. Kelly, Sr. Presided over Florissant Municipal Court

for thirty-two years (1979-2011)
5 October 1947 - 4 June 2011
Second son of Florissant Judge John J. Kelly (1956-1958). Tim grew up in Florissant attending Fatima and St. Thomas Aquinas. He presided over a firm but fair court and was elected eleven times. Tim Kelly inspired troubled young adults to strive to be good citizens and promoted leadership through athletics. Lt. Cmdr. Timothy Kelly served in the US Navy J.A.G. Corps Reserve.

#### Donald L. Bond

"Mr. North County"

17 June 1931 - 21 April 1990
Florissant Councilman 1959 - 1977
St. Louis County Councilman 1977 -1990
Don earned a reputation for fighting for his constituents, and for a high quality of life in Florissant and North County. Always easily accessible, he hosted annual picnics that are legendary. First and foremost a family man, he and Loraine raised four children. Son Ken and daughter Jackie also served on the Florissant City Council. Don was also a successful businessman with an insurance office on St. Francois Street.

#### St. Ferdinand III of Castile

b. 1199 – d. 5-30-1252
King of Spain from 1217 to 1252, he was canonized by Pope Clement X in 1671.
He was a capable and just administrator, spreading Christianity throughout his kingdom. He drove the Moors out of most of Spain, founded monasteries, established the University of Salamanca and endowed hospitals.

#### **Charlotte Ballard**

19 November 1909 – 13 August 1999
Sole owner of Ballard Plumbing after her husband Lawrence died. First woman in MO to hold a Master Plumber license. Charter member Florissant Valley Historical Society and Florissant Old Town Partners. President Florissant Valley Sheltered Workshop. Founding Member Friends of Old St. Ferdinand, Soroptimist Member and TEAM volunteer. No matter how busy, she always made time to help others and did these kindnesses quietly, touching many lives. Her example of community service will always inspire us.

#### David L. Reynolds

7 November 1936 – 9 January 2003

A United States Navy veteran, Dave served on the Florissant City Council from 1976 - 1994 and was Council President in 1979. He served as President of the St. Louis County Municipal League in 1988 and was elected to four terms as a Missouri State Representative, 1959 - 2003. Former owner/editor of the Florissant Valley Reporter and member of many community organizations including Rotary, Knights of Columbus and Chamber of Commerce.

#### Pierre-Jean De Smet, S.J.

b. 1-30-1801 – d.5-23-1873

Born in Termonde, Belgium, he came to the United States in 1821 and entered the Jesuit novitiate at White Marsh, Maryland. In 1823, he was sent to establish a new Jesuit mission in Florissant where he was ordained on September 23, 1827.

Called the Black Robe by the Indians, it is said he traveled more than 180,000 miles on foot, horseback and ship, crossing the ocean18 times to bring Christianity to the Native Americans.

#### Lowell E. Girardier

Community Volunteer & Builder 7 March 1929 - 26 March 2010 Lowell founded Girardier Building & Realty contracting in 1955 & built many Florissant homes, churches, schools, stores & offices. Donated & moved VOF/OTP HQ building. Co-founder DePaul Foundation, SSM DePaul Health Center advisory board, President Florissant Rotary, Chamber 1992 Business Person of the Year, Rosary High Ambassador's Award, Director Marygrove, Florissant Valley Shelter Workshop, Emerson Electric YMCA. President NCI, received Elmer Belsha Leadership Award. He & Bev exemplified pride in North County through Volunteerism helping many organizations.

## Catherine "Kay" Spring Historic Preservationist

28 May 1936 -11 December 2017
Kay dedicated her life working for the City of Florissant with a genuine affection for everyone she met. Kay played key roles in renovating many treasures including the John B. Meyers House/Barn, Archambault House, the Log Cabin & the Gittemeier House. She served on numerous committees & volunteered for Historic Florissant Inc., Florissant Valley Historical Society & Old St Ferdinand Shrine, Kay loved all things Florissant & set a great example for

our historic preservation.

#### Rosemary Straub Davison

7 August 1918 - 23 September 2014
"Preservationist & Historian"
Rosemary was committed to preserving historically significant homes and buildings that helped shape Florissant. She was on the Board of Freeholders that formed our current city charter, was City Clerk from 1963 -1979 and was a founding member of the Missouri Heritage Trust, Florissant Valley Historical Society, Friends of Old St.

Ferdinand, Heritage Foundation, and Historic Florissant, Inc. For years she was a columnist for the Florissant Valley Reporter and was the author of the book "Florissant, Missouri" published in 2002.

#### Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne

b. 8-29-1769 — d. 11-18-1852

To the Native Americans, she was the Woman Who Always Prays. Born in France, she came to Florissant in 1819. Her convent home still stands and with Old St.

Ferdinand's Shrine is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. She opened the first school in Florissant for the village children and a boarding school for the daughters of wealthy St. Louis families. In her time, she was described as the foremost educator in the State of Missouri.

She was canonized by the Roman Catholic Church in 1988.

#### Gretchen Baum Crank

2 March 1948 – 17 November 2016
Florissant history was her passion from childhood. Gretchen helped save the Myers House from demolition when Highway 170 was built & later became President of Historic Florissant dedicated to preserving the Gittemeier House. She served on the Old Town Commission, Friends of Old St. Ferdinand, Florissant Landmark Commission & St. Louis County Historic Building Commission. She wrote & published "Reflections of the Florissant Valley."

She loved her family, traveling & life in Florissant.

#### Patrick G. Click, Sr.

17 March 1940 – 18 October 2015
Pat co-owned Click Heating & Cooling with his wife Lora during 50 years of marriage. A mainstay on "Old Town" St. Francois for 41 years. Pat served 10 years in the U.S. Navy, & was at tip of spear during Cuban Missile Crisis. Rotary Paul Harris Fellow, Old Town Partners, Fine Arts Council & Valley of Flowers. Pat & Lora were honored as Business Couple of the year by GNC Chamber. Pat served his Church, supported Veterans & lived for his family.

#### James (Jay) Russell

Born on November 4, 1928 in St. Louis. Statesman and Florissant businessman. Jay was Missouri State Legislator from 1962 -1990 Lewis & Clark Democratic Committeeman 1970 - 2008 House of Representatives - Chairman -Appropriations - member of numerous committees. He appropriated funds with MSD to contain many creeks eroding resident and city properties. He authored the bill creating The School of Optometry at University of Missouri - St. Louis. Jay sponsored the law for sports medicine. Established BJ's Bar and Restaurant in 1955. MO State Committeeman - 4th Degree Knight of Columbus. Veteran of U.S. Marine Corps.

#### Harry S. Truman

While campaigning for the 1934 State Senate Race, Harry S. Truman gave a speech, at this spot, to the residents of the farming community of Florissant. Upon completion of his speech, he visited with shop owners on St. Francois Street. In 1945, Truman was sworn in as the 33rd President of the United States.

#### Kenneth J. "Ken" Otto

"Handyman Hardware Humanitarian"
16 November 1927 – 6 January 2006
Ken had a lifetime of community service in
two cities & St. Louis County. He served
Pine Lawn as Mayor, Alderman & businessman. In Florissant he owned two popular hi
touch Handyman Hardware stores with wife
Kathleen & sons Dave & Glenn, was
Marygrove Man of the Year & Business
Person of the Year & was a leader in the
Florissant Rotary efforts to help others. He
served 20 years on the County Planning
Commission.

#### First Lieutenant Michael J. Blassie Vietnam Era Unknown Soldier

4 April 1948-11 May 1972
Florissant patriot graduated Air Force
Academy, fighter pilot 8th Special Ops
Squadron Vietnam. Silver Star,
Distinguished Flying Cross Air Metal. May
11, 1972 his A-37 Dragonfly was shot down
during his 138th combat mission. His
remains, classified "unknown but to God",
randomly chosen Vietnam Unknown Soldier
at Arlington with full military honors, Medal
of Honor by President Reagan.

Advances in DNA identified remains in 1998 & he returned home to Florissant for funeral at St. Dismas, internment at Jefferson Barracks.

#### **Thomas Jefferson**

13 April 1743 –
4 July 1826 (50th annv. of 1776)
Third President of the United States from
1801 to 1809; a principal American founding
father & author of the Declaration of
Independence; Father of the 1804 Louisiana
Purchase that doubled the Nation's size
bringing St. Ferdinand De Fleurissant into
the USA & enabling Missouri to become a
State with a capital named in his honor;
He used his intellect & eloquence to
advance democracy, republicanism
& science.

Frank B. Korte 8 Sept. 1916 – 5 Nov. 2002 Josephine "Jo" Korte 23 Jan. 1920 – 12 April 2015

Frank and Jo married in 1943 and opened Korte Hardware, 610 St, Francois, in 1946. Devoted to family and faith they put a priority on community service with leadership roles in Fire Department, Hospital, Chamber, Valley of Flowers, Historical Preservation, St. Ferdinand Shrine, Knights, Rotary, Marygrove and others receiving prestigious recognition.

Married over 50 years raising 11 children, their successful hard work and commitment is an example of dedication to inspire future generations of Florissant Families.

### **John M. & Pearl Dooley** 15 May 1927 – 5 March 1986

15 May 1927 – 5 March 1986 18 June 1924 – 13 May 2015 John & Pearl opened Dooley's Florist July, 1966 raising 6 children & 1 niece in the

1966 raising 6 children & 1 niece in the family business with all working at the store. Pearl ran the accredited florist shop while John, a WWII veteran was a proud member of the Pipefitters Local 562 & later opened Dooley Travel Svc.

They both felt family, church & community were important & were active members in the Chamber, Rotary, Soroptimist, Lions, Historic Florissant & Old Town Partners.

### **Their Last Full Measure**



Florissant Honors Its Vietnam War Fallen Heroes with a timeless obelisk that was dedicated on July 4, 1969. A ceremony to commemorate the 50th anniversary of that dedication will take place at Noon on July 4, 2019.

The United States conflict in Vietnam lasted from 1961 to 1975. Among those who gave their lives in this war were at least forty-one young men from Florissant. A timeless obelisk was commissioned by a


patriotic Florissant Community to honor those brave souls who gave the last full measure of devotion to our Nation during the Vietnam War.

The Florissant Vietnam Memorial was dedicated on July 4, 1969. U.S. Congressman James Symington was the Master of Ceremonies at the dedication ceremony at the entrance to Koch Park near the JFK Center on Howdershell Road.

Some names of the fallen were etched on the monument when it was dedicated and more names were added later when knowledge of their deaths became known. The first name on the monument is that of Charles E. Delassus who is the Great, Great, Great, Great Grandson of the last Spanish/French Lt. Governor of the Louisiana Territory when the sovereignty of the territory was transferred to the United States.

Additional names were added to the monument after the dedication as knowledge of their deaths became known. Among those added was the name of Michael Blassie, originally interred at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. First Lt. Blassie's remains were returned home for a funeral at St. Dismas with internment at Jefferson Barracks. Charles F. Prevedel's name was also added. The federal building on Page Ave is named for Green Beret Staff Sgt. Prevedel, who is interred at Arlington, and who will join Lt. Blassie as an honoree in the Florissant Walk Through History May 29





### Recognize and Fight Fraud

For the first time in history, Impostor Scams topped the list of consumer complaints in with the Federal Trade Commission. Crooks use clever schemes to defraud millions of people every year. There are literally hundreds of different impostor scams. Listed here are four of the most common:

• Social Security Scams: In one version of the scam, the caller says your Social Security number has been compromised. He says your Social Security Number is now blocked for your protection. He might ask you for a fee to reactivate it. He will ask you to confirm your Social Security Number. THAT is the SCAM. Now they have your Social Security Number. OR... he says somebody used your Social Security num-



• IRS Scams: The caller says they are from the IRS and you owe them money. You can clear this up right now so they don't have to call your local police department by paying the balance over the phone. THIS IS A SCAM. The IRS will never call you informing you of any balance that you owe.

- **Tech Support Scams:** Unfortunately, older adults are very vulnerable to this scam. The caller says there's a problem with your computer and they are calling to help you fix it before your computer crashes. They just need you to get on your computer while you are talking to them and they will walk you through the process to fix it. When you do this, the scammer has full access to your computer and can steal any personal information in this process.
- The Grandparent Scam: You pick up the phone and hear a young man say "Grandpa?" The caller says he has been arrested for drunk driving and needs money to hire a lawyer who will help him get out of jail. He even gives you to phone number for the lawyer (which is the phone number of his accomplice). The caller proceeds to say "Please don't tell mom and dad". What grandparent wouldn't want to help their grandchild? THIS IS A SCAM.

Here are a few practical tips to help you stay a step ahead:

1. Spot impostors: Scammers often pretend to be someone you trust – like a government official, a family member, a charity or a company you do business with. Do not send money or give out personal information in response to an unexpected request - whether it comes as a text, a phone call, or an email.

**2. Don't believe caller ID.** Technology makes it easy for scammers to fake caller ID information, so the name & number you see aren't always real.

**3. Don't pay upfront for a promise.** Someone might ask you to pay in advance for things like debt relief, credit & loans, mortgage assistance, or they might say you've won a prize, but you first have to pay the taxes

One of the easiest ways to handle anyone on the other line that you're not sure about – HANG UP.

# **Chief's Corner**

Greetings,

As the warm weather months approach, the Florissant Police Department is very busy getting ready for several community programs that will be taking place, while we still maintain a strong level of service to our residents. Before I get to the programs, I just want to say "Thank You" to all of the residents, business, and organizations that involve us in their events. The members of the department always enjoy the opportunity to interact with our residents during these functions.

The police department has been very busy lately with several initiatives that I would like to share with you, but our man focus is still the response to calls for service and the prevention of criminal activity. Recently, members of the Florissant Police Department responded to a call of a carjacking where a small child was still in the car. Within two minutes, we had officers on the scene, with an additional 30 Florissant Police Officers beginning a search of the area for the vehicle and child. A Florissant Police D.A.R.E. Officer was canvassing the area after teaching for the day, and within minutes, the D.A.R.E. Officer located the victim's vehicle with the child still inside. One suspect was apprehended on foot minutes later, and after an investigation by our Detective Bureau, the second suspect was identified and taken into custody a few hours later. This is an excellent example of the dedication and resources that we can provide to our community on a daily basis.

As you make your summer vacation plans, please remember Florissant Police Department's Vacation Check Program and Security Camera Registration. Residents can request officers to check their homes while they are out of town by simply completing a form at the Florissant Police Department on or our website. After we are notified, Officers will check your home on a daily basis to ensure it is secure while you are away. The other program is the Security Camera Registration. This program encourages residents with security or doorbell cameras to register them with the department, so we know where the camera footage is within the residential areas. In the event of a crime, officers will check with the homeowners on the registry within a certain geographical area to inquire if their camera footage captured the event.

One new program that I am very excited to pass along to you is the Florissant Police Department's Future Leader Academy. This program was created by Officers Berry and Lee and will be for two weeks during the summer. The program is designed to give a group of high school aged males an



opportunity to get to know the Florissant Police Department better while learning about topics such as college preparation, military service, fitness and health, community service, public speaking, and conflict resolution. I am very proud of the officers for their "out of the box" thinking on how to better serve our community, and I am excited to see this program succeed.

Other programs that are taking place this summer is the Safety Town Program as well as the D.A.R.E to be G.R.E.A.T. camp, which are both organized by dedicated Florissant Police Officers. All of the above programs, and the many more that were not mentioned that occur year-round, such as the Police Explorer Program, Public Safety Citizens Academy, Neighborhood Watch, CERT, and Coffee with a Cop shows the commitment that we have to Community Policing, while maintaining an excellent response rate to calls for service. The Florissant Police Department prides itself on maintaining the best level of service that we can provide to our residents, and the members of our department will continue to do so. ### **Home Safety Tips** When You Go On Vacation

With vacation season fast approaching, the Florissant Police Department wishes to pass along a few tips to keep your home secure while you are on your trip:

1). Don't talk about it! Be cautious about who you tell about your trip. It is okay to tell a neighbor that you trust, but be careful about letting your whole neighborhood know that your house will be empty for an extended period of time. Also, don't post comments of social networking sites that you are leaving for a trip, or post comments while you are on vacation. You never know who is seeing those comments, and you don't want to advertise the fact that no one is at your house.

2). Use timers! Hook up timers to lights, televisions, and radios, and adjust the timers to your normal routine. This will help hide the fact that no one is home.

3). Lock up! Before leaving, make sure all of your doors, windows, garages, and sheds are secured.

4). Remember your mail! It is a good idea to request the post office to hold your mail while you are on vacation. This can be done either thru their website, or you can fill out a form at your local post office. Another option is to ask a trusted neighbor to collect your mail and newspapers while you are away.

5). Remember your answering machine and email! Don't tip anyone off that you will not be home by creating a new outgoing message for your answering machine saying that you are on vacation. Also, be cautious on what you put in automatic reply email messages.

6). Lock away your valuables! Keep valuables and important documents in a fire safe box or a safe deposit box. Also, it is always a good idea to record the serial and model numbers for your valuables so you can accurately report them missing if needed. 7). Park a car in the driveway! Give your home an appearance that someone is living there by asking a trusted neighbor to park his or her car in your driveway while you are

Outdoor lighting! Consider motion sensing lights on the outside of your house. Criminals typically do not want to be seen, so if a light comes on as they are walking around your house, it may prevent you from becoming a victim.

9). Make notifications! If you have an alarm system, make sure that they know how to get ahold of you while you are away. This can also be said about the trusted neighbor who is picking up your newspapers and mail, and who is parking a car in your driveway.

10). Complete a Vacation Check Form! The Florissant Police Department offers a free program to its residents where we check your house daily while you are on vacation. You can complete this form on website www.florissantmo.com/police or you can fill out a form at the Florissant Police Department.


