- Authentic foods: Local "mom and pop" food vendors will prepare food from Mexico, Colombia, Argentina and more. Traditional foods include empanadas, tamales, tacos, arepas and pan dulce.
- Folkloric dancers: Local folkloric dancers from Mexico, Spain and Chile will be performing throughout the weekend.
- Quinceañera fashion show: A tradition and custom for young women turning 15, local young ladies will model their beautiful dresses on Sunday, Oct. 3. at 2pm.
- Hispanic crafts: Vendors from Bolivia, Mexico and Ecuador will be selling clothing, blankets, jewelry and household goods.
- Children's Pavilion Several activities will be available for kids including piñatas, Mexican paper flowers, and other fun crafts and games.

- Car show and Lowrider bicycle show: Organized by Dedicated Car Club, these shows will feature several lowrider cars. Lowriders are a car culture started by the Mexican community in Los Angeles.
- Information booths: Several cultural organizations and businesses will acquaint the public with their programs and services.
